



Two of the people I met are hoping to help with the Bridport Sustainable Palm Oil Community, and one Year 12 student is going to do an Extended Project Qualification (EPQ, which is ½ A Level) on sustainable palm oil – just brilliant!

When you go shopping, how can you tell if there is palm oil in a product, and if it is sustainable or conventional palm oil? Many companies don't use the RSPO logo or don't even say it is certified sustainable palm oil when it is. A new app, PalmOil Scan, produced by Chester Zoo, Auckland Zoo and Cheyenne Mountain Zoo of Colorado in collaboration with the World Association of Zoos and Aquariums (WAZA), checks if the product you are about to purchase is from a company committed to sourcing sustainable palm oil. The database contains products from 1000s of brands and 100s of consumer product manufacturers to reveal how committed they are to certified sustainable palm oil globally. You can also connect with those individual brands and manufacturers via a "contact them button" on the app. Now you can shop with the confidence that you are helping save tropical species and their homes from deforestation. Download it from the App store or Google Play Store.

# NUMBER OF THE MONTH

**Number of the month: 200+.** There are actually over 200 different names for palm oil – check out the full list [here](#). The four main names for palm oil that you may find on the back of a label are Palm; Stear; Laur and Glys. These names make up about 60% of global palm oil use. However, although these names are frequently used on the back of labels, and are the firm foundations that make up the fatty acids that palm oil can be made into, to make life even trickier, they might not always refer to palm oil. If we all demand sustainable palm oil in everything, we can help make deforestation-free palm oil the norm...

We also still need more hospitality businesses and workplaces with more than 20 people before we can call ourselves the world's first sustainable palm oil county, so please get in touch if you are interested in finding out more.
